



Before my daughter was born, I thought that one of the benefits of having a child would be getting the inspiration to write a timeless classic children's book. After all *The Hobbit, The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats* – all first started life as just attempts to entertain a nearby child, if I remember

rightly.

But, though the baby came, inspiration did not. Perhaps it was for the best: reading the old Thomas the Tank *Engine* stories by the Rev'd W Awdry, I can't help but wonder how much the trains and their dramas reflect the Reverend's own parishioners. (The original Thomas

stories are also unbelievably boring.)

On the plus side, this did open up a new world to me of modern (ie later than my own childhood) children's literature: the sort of books that are printed, not on paper, but on boards, so you cannot eat them.

Julia Donaldson (*The Gruffalo*, *Room on the Broom*, etc) is obviously the queen here. Her books are so fun to recite aloud, it feels more like performing than reading: from the catchy rhythm of *The*

Gruffalo to the primitive beats of the *Tales from Acorn Woods* series, specially for little children, "Poor old fox / has lost his socks / he looks in a chest / and finds his vest". The only criticism I have is that the lift-the-flap flaps can sometimes be hard to flip.

Even in the land of baby's board books,

there can be a certain, unexpected darkness; even deeper the momentary peril of being threatened by a dragon or Gruffalo. In Ion Klassen's award winning I Want My Hat Back and sequels, the theft of a hat is punished severely. In Not Now,

punished severely. In Not Now, Bernard, a small boy who is regularly ignored by his parents ("not now, Bernard"), is eaten by a monster, who then tries to menace Bernard's parents, only to be ignored in turn. It's like something out of Kafka.

Of course, darkness in children's literature is one of those things that 'twas ever thus, "Don't go into Mr McGregor's garden," warned old Mrs Rabbit, "your Father had an accident there; he was put in a pie by Mrs McGregor." What repressed trauma indeed!

G K Chesterton (1874-1936) famously defended darkness in children's stories, the child would have made the dragon in his imagination anyway; the story tells him that St George can slay the dragon. Or at least – looking back to some of the stories above – we can suggest that the dragon is something one can at least cope with, even with a wry smile.

This is something I think about at baptisms. Baptism is a good thing and nice: a "washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3.5). But it is also being united with Christ in his death (Romans 6.3-4). Dipping someone into the font is the image is of washing, but also of drowning, or burial – and resurrection. In ancient icons of the baptism of Jesus, the waters of baptism look dark and murky indeed – sometimes the painter even adds dragons!

This isn't something we talk about much at baptisms. But maybe we should. Baptism is not just a nice thing to do, but a real gift for a real, sometimes dark and dangerous world. The same world that Christ came into, and which literally buried him; but which he also overcame.

Meanwhile I see from the news that some American schools have banned the Bible, as a book not suitable for younger readers. But the darkness still is there, whether you dare to look at it or not. And darkness is something that the Bible never fails to engage with – in many, sometimes complicated, ways, admittedly. But the Bible is clear that darkness, in the end, is never able to overcome the light of the world, the light of the Word, which is a lantern to our feet and a light to our path.(Psalm 119.105).

Someone once told me a story about a local school who wanted a talk on Easter – 'but could you try not to mention the crucifixion?' Yet even Elowen's little lift-the-flap Bible does not shy away from this:

"Jesus knew he would die. It was all right. God planned it long ago. Jesus would take the blame for every wrong thing anyone had ever done. The soldiers killed Jesus on a cross. They put his body in a tomb and rolled a stone in front. But God's special plan hadn't ended..."*



We were delighted to welcome Bishop Hugh to our Church for our June meeting

Bishop Hugh is currently the Bishop of St Germans and the Armed Forces Bishop. He comes from a Christian family and many of his family were members of the clergy. He had no thoughts of becoming a priest although he has been a Christian all his life. One day he went into a second-hand bookshop that had a book on the shelf about Community work, thought that God had led him there and decided to go to a community in L'Arche (people with and without learning disability, on a mission to build a world where everyone belongs) and was amazed by it. When he returned to London he went to the L'Arche centre where he stayed for 15 years. He said that he had learned about the 'beauty' of people whilst there.

After leaving L'Arche, Hugh became a priest and served in Kent for several years. He was consecrated as a Bishop in Lambeth Palace during the time of Covid and moved to Cornwall with his wife and children to be installed as Bishop of St Germans and later as the Armed Forces Bishop.

We had a very interesting Q&A session after which the members responded with a round of rapturous applause and thanked him for giving his time to talk to us.

In July our members will be visiting the Weary Friar to enjoy a meal together and then in August we are delighted to welcome guest speaker Canon Chancellor of Truro Cathedral, Alan Bashforth.
