"May is Mary's month, and I / Muse at that and wonder why," wrote Gerard Hopkins, the trendy Victorian Jesuit poet. He was referring to the traditional association of May with Blessed Virgin Mary-related activities. It is on the May bank holiday, for example, that some

members of the Church of England hie themselves to Walsingham for the National Pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham. This is a fairly big deal: the Archbishop of Canterbury has been (he was guest preacher in 2019) as even have I. The centrepiece of the day is a long procession around the village accompanied to an even longer hymn: the famous Walsingham Pilgrim's Hymn, about 100

rhyming couplets explaining the history, destruction, and restoration of the medieval shrine. (Sample verse: "But at last came a King who had greed in his eyes / And he lusted for treasure with fraud and with lies.") Every year the procession is notoriously confronted by protests from more, er, reformed protestant Christians, who wave placards and barrack their lace-wearing brethren. I remember one Ulsterman pointing at the statue of Mary as it went past: "If she's that all great, then why doesn't she walk?"

Anyway, it is all good fun. But I am

reminded of a vicar who opined, 'most Anglicans ought to think more about Mary; a small number ought to much less'. I suspect that most of us probably fall into the former category – the vague lukewarm middle – and it's always worth being reminded that 'being moderate' is

> not equal to 'being righť.

So ought we to think more about Mary? Obviously there's a complicated history there. One can't help but think some medieval (and later) claims about Mary are frankly misguided: as illustrated by the medieval image of Mary sheltering Christians who are being shot at by Jesus!

Yet Mary is important. Jesus might have

remarked, "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother," (Mk 3.33,35), but even under the strange conditions of the Kingdom, Mary still ends the gospel as mother: "Then he said to the disciple, 'here is your mother'" (Jn 19.27). And we last see Mary with the disciples as they pray in preparation for Pentecost (Acts 1.12-14).

None of that is controversial of course. But calculating theological assertions is one thing; another is how far we might let the spirit of Marian devotion - flower, sweetness, sentiment – mingle with the
