Remembering those who have gone before us is significant and important, it makes us think about our own lives, their purposes, and the journeys that we take, and ultimately the destination for us all.

What shapes our destinations is of course our faith, and how it is shaped by what the bible tells us.

So let us look at 10 things the bible asks us to remember.

1. We are saved by grace not by works, but our works should reflect our beliefs.

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one can boast.

Ephesians 2:8-9

2. It is impossible to please God without believing in Him and actually believing Him.

Without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.

Hebrews 11:6

3. There isn't anything created that has the power to separate us from God's love.

For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities nor powers, nor things present nor things to come, nor height nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ lesus our Lord.

Romans 8:38-39

4. God does not choose according to the world's standards; he chooses according to His own will.

But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things – and the things that are not – to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before him.



Our Church Saints

John West is kindly writing a series about the saints associated with our Churches. This month is the turn of St Faith.

St Faith

St Faith was born in the third century at Agen in Aquitaine. As a young woman she was arrested during the persecution of Christians by the Roman Empire for refusing to make pagan sacrifices. She was tortured to death with a red-hot brazier; this may have been at the end of the third or the beginning of the fourth century.



The saint's feast day is 6 October and she is venerated in the Eastern Orthodox Church, Roman Catholic and the Anglican Communion. She became the Patron Saint of Pilgrims, Prisoners and Soldiers.

Her tomb, in, the basilica at Agen, was broken into in 866 by monks who stole her bones and transferred them to their abbatial church of Foy in Conques on the leading pilgrimage route to Compostela (Way of Saint James).

The reliquary was made in the ninth century using a head that may have been that of a fifth century Roman and was mounted on a wooden core covered in gold plating. The figure stands 833mm tall and over the years was credited with many miracles and pilgrims added a crown and earrings.

A number of stories exist regarding St Faith and she has been confused with the three legendary sisters *Faith*, *Hope and Charity*.
