September Reflections: What Does It Mean to Be Christian?

As we turn the page into September – with its shifting light, cooler mornings, and the quiet hum of new beginnings – it's a fitting moment to reflect on the heart of our Christian life. This autumn, our Confirmation course is drawing from Rowan Williams' Being Christian, a book that offers a clear and thoughtful exploration of four practices that shape our faith: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, and Prayer.

Baptism, Williams reminds us, is not just a personal milestone – it's a communal moment. It marks our entry into a shared life, a belonging that

welcome confirmation candidates this season, we're reminded of our own baptismal promises – to seek Christ in all people and to walk in the way of peace.

The Bible is not a static text, but a living conversation. Williams encourages us to approach scripture not simply for information, but for transformation. The Bible invites us to listen – to the stories of those who have wrestled with God, rejoiced in God, and discovered grace in unexpected places. As we gather for worship and study, may we be open to hearing God's voice afresh, and to letting

scripture shape our lives with wisdom and compassion.

The Eucharist is a place of encounter. Williams describes it as the moment where we remember Jesus' life, death, and resurrection – and where we are invited to receive, with gratitude, the gift of God's presence. It is a practice of humility and hope, reminding us that we are sustained not by our own strength, but by grace. As we share bread and wine, we do so in trust, knowing that God meets us in the ordinary and the sacred.

Prayer, Williams writes, is 'being where God that can happen.' It's not about

perfect words or polished rituals – it's about openness.
Whether in silence, in song, or in the quiet prayers of our hearts, we are invited to be present to God, and to allow God to be present to us. In the busyness of September, may we find moments

to pause, to breathe, and to pray – for our world, our neighbours, and ourselves.

These four practices – Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, and Prayer – are not tasks to complete, but ways of living. They help us stay rooted in faith, connected to one another, and open to the movement of the Holy Spirit. As we begin this new season, may we walk together with curiosity, courage, and kindness.

In July MOSSAF Members enjoyed a meal together at the Weary Friar.

Then for our August meeting we had two guest speakers for the first time.

Wife and husband – Rev'd Dr Sally & Rev'd Paul Nash who spoke to us about their faith journeys.

Sally was baptised on Palm Sunday at St Peter's Church, Earley, near Reading. Her first introduction to church came when a friend invited her to a Baptist service, where she committed her life to Jesus. She attended Sunday school, was confirmed, and later joined an independent church (where she married Paul), finding it deeply inspirational. During this time, she sensed God asking what she was willing to give up for Him. In response, she left her job and joined Youth for Christ in Luton. After a brief return to teaching, she resumed youth work, training in Youth Work at St John's College, Nottingham. Sally developed a lasting passion for supporting young children.

Paul grew up on a council estate in Essex and described his father as a 'scally-wag.' Struggling at school, he was invited by a neighbour to the local Baptist youth group, where he discovered faith and was baptised at 16. Though academically weak, he excelled in cookery, studying catering at Technical College. His skills led him to prestigious London hotels, including the Savoy and the Dorchester. Alongside work, Paul engaged in youth ministry, eventually joining Youth for Christ in Birmingham. He trained in ministry at Queens College, exploring ordination, and served as a Stipendiary Minister in his third year. Paul ministered for five years at Birmingham's first multicultural church in Aston, followed by part-time community care work. He later became Chaplain for paediatric spiritual care at Birmingham Children's Hospital, a post he recently left.

In April, Paul and Sally moved to Cargreen, Saltash. As they shared their journeys, they chose two songs – Graham Kendrick's *Paid on the Nail* and *Don't You Know the Father Loves You* – both deeply emotional reflections of their faith.

Our next meeting is on 8th September at 7pm where Jonny Libby from Central Hall Plymouth will be our speaker.

As well as being a busy mum and the supportive wife of the local Baptist Minister, Michelle is the Chaplain at the University. She kindly served us coffee and then conducted us around giving an interesting talk as we toured. The University was quieter then usual as the summer break approached, but we met some staff and students and heard the history of the site in the north of Plymouth. It has grown from a small complex into a substantial area offering many courses whilst adhering to its Christian principles of caring for its intake and the local area. Michelle and her co-workers are always available to the students and the Chapel and the Welfare Suite are welcoming areas for all to visit.

We thanked Michelle for her hospitality and she joined us for lunch at the nearby George Hotel at Southway.

A Book to Remember...

We continue our series in which a member of one of our six congregations is invited to tell us about a book that has been important to them in their Christian journey.



Richard Hosking

is a worship leader at Landulph and Botus Fleming. Now, retired from working in horticulture, he assists at a local undertaker's, F D Hall, which he finds is 'a wonderful

opportunity to put people at ease, especially with his local connections.

Richard describes his whole family as 'church through and through'. He remembers first taking an interest in what was happening in church at the age of six. At first, 'I didn't understand a bit what was going on,' but he attended the eucharist and evensong with his father, the church warden. He went on to read the lesson, then joined the choir, where his auntie Dorothy Willcocks was the organist. He learned to serve and became the crucifer.

He explored becoming a worship leader, a role which was only just being talked about at that time, but which was needed due to a clergy vacancy. Although initially put off by the vicar, which even caused his own dad to be doubtful, others encouraged him, and he completed the training, 'I felt the calling from God through my father and brothers, and I wanted to give something back to the people of what I had so much enjoyed'.

Richard's **Book to Remember** is the *New English Bible*, and specifically the copy he was presented with in 1967 at Landulph Sunday School, and to which he still refers. Richard remembers being taught in the rectory rooms by Peter Braund, with Pauline du Plessis (then a teenager, and a member of the well-known daffodil growing family) playing *We love the place O God*, and a limited range of other hymns, on the piano. Richard would tie his Yorkshire terrier, Mitzi, up to a tap just outside!

Richard finds the translation straightforward and inspiring to read, for example, John 14 begins; 'Do not let your hearts be distressed'.

'The New English Bible' was received with great excitement when the New Testament first appeared in 1961. It is now difficult to get hold of, having been superseded by the Revised English Bible. However, the large bible on the lectern at St Stephen is a New English Bible.



St Erney Church Quiz - Answers

 There is carved woodwork dating from the 1920/30s in the church. Who carved it?



Answer: Violet Pinwill.

2. Why is there a grave in the churchyard, under a tree, marked by a stone cross which never seems to have had words on it?



Answer: There is said to have been a Russian princess buried at dead of night, under a tree during the First World War. This story was told by a family who were resident in St Erney at around that time.

3. Which former headmaster of Sir Robert Gefferies School is buried in the churchyard (on the south side of the church)?

Answer: Robert Foreman.

4. High in the main East window are depictions of three angels playing medieval instruments. What are the instruments?



Answer: a one drone bagpipe, a crowd and a gittern. Our informant says the depictions are unusually accurate. A crowd was a forerunner of the violin, and a gittern was a forerunner of the guitar.

5. What is thought to possibly be the oldest object in the church?



Answer: The font.

6. A brass plaque at the back of church commemorates a major restoration in Victorian times. What date is on it?



Answer: 1872.

7. What is the floor of the south porch of the church made of, at least in part?



Answer: Reused gravestones

8. What is the purpose of the diamond shaped painting on the north wall inside the church?



Answer: A funeral hatchment. It commemorates a female of the Blake family which is why it is diamond shaped.

9. What animals are depicted around St Francis in the stained glass window in the south wall of the church?



Answer: Deer.
