



and worship, pastoral care and local outreach going for the past 18 months.

forty days and forty nights when we 'awhile from joys abstain', focusing on our Lord and master Jesus Christ, his life and death and the way of the cross, which is the strange glory of God. I am excited to be sharing that journey with you.

Please pray for Kayleigh, Elowen and me as we prepare for the move, and for our new life, and for saying our goodbyes here very soon. And please pray also, as St Paul says, for a door to be opened for the gospel – for I suspect everyone nowadays needs to hear a word of good news more than ever.

A big thank you to Sylvia, Carol and team for serving refreshments on the night and all who donated towards the evening.




February 17th

A lamb could not get born. Ice wind Out of a downpour dishclout sunrise. The mother Lay on the mudded slope. Harried, she got up And the blackish lump bobbed at her back-end Under her tail. After some hard galloping, Some manoeuvring, much flapping of the backward Lump head of the lamb looking out, I caught her with a rope. Laid her, head uphill And examined the lamb. A blood-ball swollen Tight in its black felt, its mouth gap Squashed crooked, tongue stuck out, black-purple, Strangled by its mother. I felt inside, Past the noose of mother-flesh, into the slippery Muscled tunnel, fingering for a hoof, Right back to the port-hole of the pelvis. But there was no hoof. He had stuck his head out too early And his feet could not follow. He should have Felt his way, tip-toe, his toes Tucked up under his nose For a safe landing. So I kneeled wrestling With her groans. No hand could squeeze past The lamb's neck into her interior To hook a knee. I roped that baby head And hauled till she cried out and tried To get up and I saw it was useless. I went Two miles for the injection and a razor. Sliced the lamb's throat-strings, levered with a knife Between the vertebrae and brought the head off To stare at its mother, its pipes sitting in the mud With all earth for a body. Then pushed The neck-stump right back in, and as I pushed She pushed. She pushed crying and I pushed gasping, And the strength Of the birth push and the push of my thumb Against that wobbly vertebra were deadlock, A to-fro futility. Till I forced A hand past and got a knee. Then like Pulling myself to the ceiling with one finger Hooked in a loop, timing my effort To her birth push groans, I pulled against The corpse that would not come. Till it came. And after it the long, sudden, yolk-yellow Parcel of life In a smoking slather of oils and soups and syrups— And the body lay born, beside a hacked-off head.

Next steps

It is recognised that these interact, and that churches may well want to prioritise them differently, depending on their particular circumstances, but all will play a part in becoming more **fruitful** and **sustainable**. While there is certainly a challenge to be open to new ways of reaching into and serving our communities, we also need to sustain those who are already part of our fellowship – with opportunities for prayer, worship and learning together.

The Working Group is now considering how to embed all that has been discerned from listening to those both inside and outside the church into a formal Deanery Plan which is forward-looking, imaginative and affordable – in short, both fruitful and sustainable. The aim is that this will go to churches for feedback during February, then be redrafted if necessary before review with the Bishops during March, with the final version being presented to the Deanery Synod for formal approval in April.

So, the process is far from over and your comments and ideas are still welcome as we move into these final stages. Do please keep praying for those of us who are actively involved in the process and for an outcome that takes us forward together effectively in mission and ministry.



Prayer for February

February is a month associated with love more than any other.

Chapter 13 of Paul's letter to the Corinthian Church – written in the middle of the first century – is one of the greatest reminders to us today of what real love looks like ... and what it does not look like.

Widely read at weddings, it is known sometimes as the Love Chapter:

Love is patient, love is kind and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant, does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own, is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered, does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never fails...

These three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

Let us use Paul's wise words as the basis for our monthly prayer.

Heavenly Father,

Thank you that you are a loving, gracious God.

Thank you that your love is perfect, it never fails, and that nothing can separate us from your love.

We pray that our lives will overflow with the power of your love so we can make a difference in this world and bring honour to you. We ask for your help in reminding us that the most significant thing we can do in this life is simply to love you and to choose to love others.

Lord, thank you that your love is patient; help us show patience with those around us.

Lord, thank you that your love is kind; help us to extend kindness to others.

Lord, thank you that true love is not jealous; help us cast aside feelings of jealousy or hatred.

Lord, thank you that your love does not brag and is not arrogant; help us not to live with pride or arrogance, but to choose humility and grace.

Lord, thank you that true love does not act unbecomingly; help us to extend kindness, instead of rudeness, towards others.

Lord, thank you that true love does not seek its own; help us to live selflessly, looking only to our own interests.

Lord, thank you that true love is not provoked; help us not to become easily angered, but instead be slow to speak and slow to become angry.

Lord, thank you that your love does not take into account a wrong suffered; help us not to hold grudges, but to choose to forgive, even when it is difficult.

Lord, thank you that your love does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; help us to love your words of truth, may we walk in your freedom and wisdom. Let it be what drives our lives and choices every day.

Lord, thank you that your love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things; thank you that your love never fails.

Help us to love as you love. Fill us with your Spirit so that we can choose

what is best. We are weak Lord, but we know also that you are strong within us.

Thank you that it is not all up to us. Thank you that you equip us to face each day with the power of your love, your forgiveness, and your grace.
