

"Here I Am, Lord" – Finding Our Place in God's Work

Dear Friends,

There's something about spring – about new leaves, bright blossoms, and the birdsong in the early morning – that seems to stir something in the soul. Maybe that's why Eastertide is such a powerful time to talk about calling.

We don't always like that word, do we – calling? It can sound heavy, reserved for saints or clergy or those with time to spare. And yet, again and again, God calls the ordinary. The busy. The uncertain. People like you and me.

Sunday 11 May is Vocation Sunday in the church, also known as Good Shepherd Sunday. This month, I want to offer an invitation – but also a challenge. Might God be calling you to serve here as a lay worship leader or lay pastoral minister?

These are roles rooted in presence: leading prayers on a quiet Sunday morning, visiting someone in their loneliness, offering a warm word at the door or reading scripture with care. Ministry, in its truest form, is not about being perfect or pious – it's about showing up, with a willing heart.

We are the church, a church is not a building, it is a community. Each and

everyone of us has a purpose to fulfil for the life of the church so that the community is worshipping God and being the body of Christ on Earth.

I won't pretend it's easy. But there is full training for all roles in the church, the Local Pastoral Ministry course will take place in Saltash in June and July. Saying 'yes' often means stepping out of our comfort zone. It might mean giving up a bit of time, plucking up some courage, or confronting that quiet voice inside that says, "Surely not me..." But every person I've seen step into these roles has grown – in confidence, in faith, and in joy.

So I ask you to pray. Not just for others to come forward – but for your own heart to be open. If you feel a nudge, even the smallest one, come and talk to me. No pressure, no commitment – just a conversation.

God doesn't tend to shout. But God does call. And often, the call sounds a lot like this:

There's something more you could give. There's someone who needs what you already have.

MOSSAF



Our first guest speaker of the year saw Andy Earl, the current Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor, deliver a very interesting talk titled 'God's Sense of Humour'. Andy told us that as a youngster, his parents sent him to attend church, morning, afternoon and evening, in fact every service available. As Andy is blessed with a good singing voice, he became part of the choir. However, like many teenagers, Andy drifted away from the church.

When he was 16, he joined the police as a cadet and was a police officer for 33 years, working his way up to Inspector. His experience extended across public order and the vice squad.

Eventually, Andy went back to church, where he was captivated by the incense that filled the pews and this drew Andy back into the fold. He became a reader then Andy's life journey guided him to ordination. Serving his curacy at St Paul's in Barnsley, Andy became titled Rev'd Inspector and served eight years in police chaplaincy alongside his inspector role.

On this 'retirement', Andy joined the Army and served 12 years undertaking tours of duty in Afghanistan, South Sudan, Cyprus and Kenya. After this, he relocated to Cornwall to take the job of Assistant Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor. Andy has kept his hand in with the military as a member of the Army Reserve and as Chaplain to the Port and Marine Unit in Plymouth.

After a couple of years Andy progressed to his current role of Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor and is a strong advocate for the core Christian work of loving our neighbour.

Our next meeting is on Monday 12 May when we will be having a guided tour of St John's Hooe.

Grant, we pray, almighty God,



A huge thank you to everyone who helped, donated and supported the Easter Fair.


We raised an amazing £1,661.27.

Bishop Cornish Easter Service



There was very little room left at St Stephen's church when the children of Bishop Cornish school and their families filled the church for their Easter Service. Each class shared the Holy Week and Easter story in a range of different ways and sang beautifully at the top of their voices. Rev'd Laura gave an inspiring sermon to finish off a lovely afternoon.

Cornwall's Saints and Holy Wells – Part I

Since my move to Kernow in 1965 I have been fascinated by the abundance of Celtic Saints together with their associated Holy Wells. Water has been one of the necessities of life and in pagan times many springs and wells were also centres for ritual and cures. The saints and preachers bringing Christianity to our shores from Wales, Ireland or Brittany would establish their chapels or hermitages near potable water sources. Where these water sources were already used and revered by the locals the missionaries would bless them and adopt them as part of their new church.

St Piran



The accepted Patron Saint of Kernow and of Tinners is St Piran; his name in Cornish means *Little dark one* or *black* and his Feast Day falls on 5 March. His banner is a white cross on a field of black – the white represents the tin flowing from the black of our rocks. Alternatively, the white is for good overcoming the black for evil. St Piran, who was possibly Irish, was expelled for teaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ

and his power of healing. Legend tells us that he was tied to a mill stone and tossed into the raging sea which became calm and he floated over to Cornwall; landing on Perran beach. He continued to preach and established a monastery of which he became the abbot. At least three holy wells were dedicated to him and many place names bear his name but spelt Perran. He was fond of a drink and met his demise by falling down a well in c480. He was buried in Perranzabuloe but later exhumed and his relics dispersed to various reliquaries, with Exeter reputedly gaining an arm.


Our county has two other contenders for the title of "Patron" one being St Michael and the other St Petroc.

St Michael



St Michael is the Patron of the Homeless, banking, grocers, police and the "Commander of the Army of God and Protector of the Church". This saint is the only angel termed "Archangel". He threw out Angel Lucifer (the Devil) and is revered by other faiths ie Judaism, Islam and Baha'i. Truro has a feast day on 8 May, but the feast day of 29 September (Michaelmas) is reserved for all three of Kernow's Patron Saints. St Michael may be depicted with a sword, banner or scales to weigh the souls of the dead before consigning them to Heaven or Hell. He also appears vanquishing the Devil who is shown as a dragon.

St Petroc



St Petroc was born in Wales in 468, he landed near Padstow where he founded a monastery and later one in Bodmin (St Petroc's) along with other churches – some in Devon. Our neighbours also adopted him as a Patron and when he died in 564 his body had several resting places.



One, of note, being the iconic ivory casket still to be admired in his Bodmin church.

Rev'd Canon Richard Maynard



Richard was born, brought up and educated in Saltash. He read theology at King's College, London and completed his preordination training at St Boniface College, Warminster.

Richard and Diana married at St Nicholas and St Faith on 20 April 1965. Throughout their marriage they supported each other as they both pursued their vocations.

On Trinity Sunday 1967, Richard was ordained deacon in Truro Cathedral and in the following year he was ordained priest. He served his first curacy in the parish of St Ives (1967-1971) and a second curacy at Falmouth (1971-1974) before being inducted in 1974 as vicar of the United Benefice of St Germans with Tideford to which Downderry and Hessenford were subsequently added. While at St Germans, Richard was made Rural Dean of East Wivelshire (1981-85) and then an

Honorary Canon of Truro Cathedral in 1982.

In 1985 Richard was appointed Team Rector of Saltash, a newly created team ministry that embraced the parishes of SS Nicholas and Faith and St Stephen by Saltash. He held this appointment until he retired in 2008.

Throughout his ministry, Richard sought to uphold the distinctive understanding of the priestly ministry traditionally held by the Church of England. This is to extend the ministry of the Church to everyone in the community, and not just to minister to a congregation. Thus, Richard entered into many aspects of the life of the town including being chaplain to the Mayor on several occasions, being chaplain to St Barnabas Hospital, Chair of Governors at Bishop **Cornish Primary School** and a governor at the local comprehensive school. Richard also helped to develop the ecumenical relationships between the clergy and the various denominations in Saltash.

In both of his incumbencies he oversaw major restorations to the fabric of the church buildings, ensured that the liturgical life of the parishes was of the highest order, while his preaching was informed by a commitment to continuing reading and study of theology that only slowed a few weeks before he died. Richard fostered the vocation to ordained ministry in others and trained curates. Every aspect of his ministry was underpinned by daily prayer and the celebration of the Eucharist.

Beyond all that, the attention Richard gave to his pastoral work at any hour of the day or night, meant that many parishioners, who might never have attended a church, were helped in times of crisis.

In retirement Richard continued to exercise his ministry, for two years as Priest in Charge at St Clether and Laneast and then, assisting the clergy in and around Launceston. He continued to celebrate Holy Communion at least once a month up until a few weeks before he died, peacefully in Launceston Hospital on 1 April. Richard's funeral will take place at Lezant Parish Church on Tuesday 6 May at 2pm. (No flowers by request, but if desired, donations to St Petroc's Trust, Newham Road, Truro TR1 2DP.)

May Richard rest in peace and, with all the faithful departed, rise in glory.



From the Archives Andy Evans

Some time ago I came across a small book, **In His Presence** – Series 2 & 3 Editions from 1973 by the Rev'd Denis E Taylor, a former Dean of Brisbane, Australia.

Last month I covered the first part of the section **What is the Church?** This month I'm covering the next section.



Why is Holy Communion sometimes said and sometimes sung?

Most churches have Holy Communion early, perhaps 7am, 8am or perhaps at 9.30am. The early service is almost sure to be said, quite simple



with no singing or sermon. Many churches today have a Parish or Family Communion service, usually about 9am with simple singing and a short sermon and often with breakfast in the church hall afterwards (*you can certainly tell times have changed since this book was written!*), this is excellent because a meal together expresses fellowship which should exist among fellow worshippers symbolised by the way we all kneel together at the altar rails.

Many churches have a choral celebration of the Holy Communion or Sung Eucharist about 11am, when the Liturgy is sung, there are hymns and a sermon. The definition of an Eucharist is "The Great Thanksgiving", that is the emphasis of this service.

Next month we'll move on to the final chapter in this book, comparing the differences in the service of the 1970s and today.

As always I am looking to include all our churches and not just St Nick's in the Archives. If you have any articles you think that would be of interest to add to our Archives, please let me know. Andy Evans (andy@saltashteamministry.org)

Answer: Lt Col William P. Drury and Captain Edward Hawkins.

10. In which year was St Faith's Chapel repaired?



Answer: 1689 (plaque above the North East door outside).
