Living Hope and the Resurrection: A Light in Our Darkness

Dear Friends,

As we move through the season of Lent and approach the joy of Easter, we are reminded once again of the powerful promise of resurrection, and the living hope we have in Christ. Living Hope has been the theme of our Lent course where we have looked at being imperfect, trusting, being together, noticing, courage and transformation. For many of us, life is often filled with both joy and sorrow, light and darkness. We are sometimes overwhelmed by the challenges that life brings – personal struggles, the loss of loved ones, and the weight of a world in turmoil. But in the midst of it all, there is a resurrection hope that stands firm, a hope that is not just for the future but is meant to be lived today. This hope is not wishful thinking or a fleeting dream; it is the certainty of God's ongoing presence and power in our lives. It is living hope.

The resurrection of Jesus isn't merely an event that happened over 2,000 years ago; it is the foundation of our faith, the assurance that no matter what happens in

life, we have a future with God that is secure. This living hope is a reality that shapes how we live, love, and serve in the world.

Resurrection is about transformation. It is about new life emerging from what seemed like an impossible situation. It is about the potential for change, even in the most barren places of our hearts and our world. The resurrection of Jesus shows us that God's power can bring life from death, light from darkness, and hope from despair.

Living hope means that we are called to live differently. The resurrection isn't just a promise for the life to come, it is also a call to action in the here and now. If we believe in the power of resurrection, we are compelled to live as people who bring life and light into the world around us. We are called to be agents of transformation, to speak out for justice, to offer compassion, and to serve others in the name of Christ.

As we reflect on the resurrection this Easter, let us remember that the hope we

from Bishop Graham

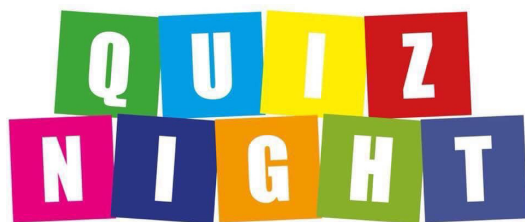
It was a pleasure to join the congregation at Landulph (and some others from further afield in the area) on Sunday March 2nd, and to celebrate the eucharist and preach at Laura's invitation. It was very gracious of Laura to ask me, and a privilege to share her ministry among you, at the end of her first year with you all.



I was delighted to discover yet another deeply rural church in this diocese in good heart and with such faithful lay leaders. We worshipped that day on hallowed ground where prayers have been said for centuries. Sometimes our small churches do not feel valued in the wider Church of England, but my visits to many small churches in this diocese have led me to discover (as at Landulph) deep faithfulness, connectedness with the wider community, and congregations in which there is frequently both mutual support and pastoral care. Devotion to God and each other and connection with the community beyond is the bedrock of Christian mission. Jesus himself looked to just twelve people to be his apostles. Be encouraged! A Book to Remember...

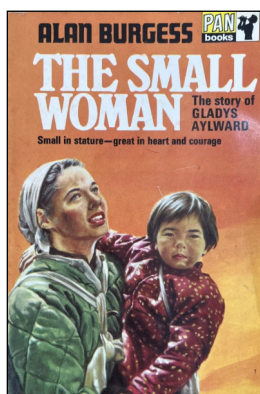
and her husband Martin live in Landulph and are actively involved in St Leonard and St Dilpe's church, and the community. Sally, a retired headteacher, has written the lovely children's book *Chap's Toast* which features her Jack Russell dog. Recently, Sally directed the parish pantomime Peter Pan. Having grown up on a farm near Callington, Sally has returned to her family church and is very involved in Landulph's Festival of Music and Arts every October.

Which book have you chosen?

Being a former English teacher, who loves poetry, novels and drama, there is so much to choose from. However, my choice has

settled on **The Small Woman**, by Gladys Aylward. She came to my school in Callington when I was about eleven. She was a tiny, elderly woman, but she lit something within me. Her story made a terrific impression.

In her book, which is the story of her life, Gladys Aylward asks God what she should do with her life. She feels called to become a missionary in China, "a country thousands of miles away about which I knew nothing". Being from such an ordinary background, and a woman, she faced



setback after setback, struggling with learning the Chinese language and being turned away by the establishment. The whole drama of her story appeals to me. She believes that,

like Moses, she could decide either "to do something or nothing".

Gladys Aylward was also not afraid to question her faith. Her story shows how goodness will prevail, but even if it does not, we can have the strength to manage life. Her implicit trust in God enables her to overcome tremendous challenges, "Be ye not afraid of them – I am your God."

Is there a particular passage that stands out for you?

There is one incident in which she faces crossing the Yellow River with a group of 100 orphaned children, to lead them to safety in war-torn China. It seems impossible, but one of the children innocently reminds Gladys of her own teachings about faith, "I had staked my life on God's mighty power, so why doubt it now?" They all pray and their prayers are answered. The dilemma of this situation and the child's simple logic makes this passage so memorable.

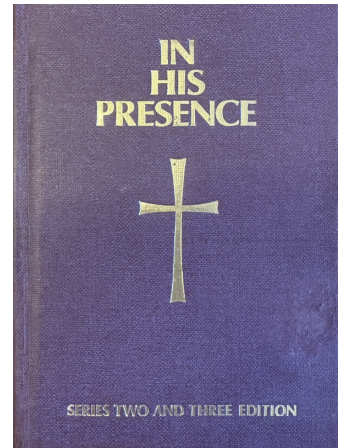

From the Archives

Andy Evans

Some time ago I came across a small book, **In His Presence** – Series 2 & 3 Editions from 1973 by the Rev'd Denis E Taylor, a former Dean of Brisbane, Australia.

Last month I covered the first part of the book **What is Prayer?** This month I'm covering the next section.



What is the Church?

The Cambridge Dictionary defines the answer as “A building for Christian religious activities” and the Oxford English Dictionary gives three definitions, (getting sidetracked slightly here, but I immediately think of the sketch from **Blackadder Goes Forth**, where Blackadder lists the great universities “Cambridge, Hull, Oxford”, and Melchet replies “and Oxford is a complete dump”), anyway getting back on track, the OED goes into great depth with its definitions. However, this book gives the most appropriate answer “A *divine society, because founded by Jesus Christ.*” Whit Sunday is called the birthday of the church.

What is the Church For?

To carry on what Jesus began – to teach the people goodness, holiness and to love God, and for his purpose for men, to restore the relationship between God and man, broken by man's disobedience, which we call a sin. The church is to be the family of God's people, uniting them in worship and in work to setup his reign of Justice and love.

Why Two Bishops in Cornwall?

Many people have asked why do we need two Bishops in Cornwall. This little book explains it quite clearly. A large diocese may have a suffragan or an assistant Bishop. If you think of the size of the Exeter diocese, and then think of Cornwall, whilst Cornwall is actually narrower than Devon, it's a larger diocese.

Answer: Boxing Day (26 December)

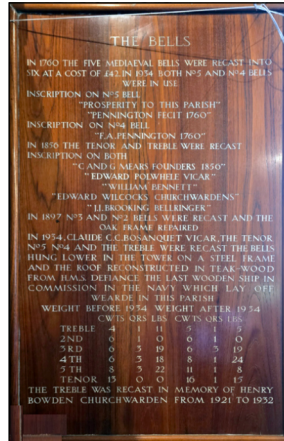
3. In which century was a church first built on the current church site?
